

### 2023 Veteran of the Year

Lisa Carrington Firmin, Colonel, Ret., USAF



isa Carrington Firmin is a Latina, combat vet, writer, award winning author, and poet. Founder/CEO of Carrington Firmin LLC providing writing and consulting services in Leadership, Veterans, Transitions, Military Sexual Trauma (MST) and Diversity and Inclusion. Her poetry is an intimate reflection into the invisible wounds of MST, PTSD, trauma, combat, and life's challenges. Featured on various media to include documentary regarding her poetry, leadership, advocacy for underrepresented populations in addition to her book, Stories from the Front: Pain, Betrayal, and Resilience on the MST Battlefield. Coming in November 2023 is Latina Warrior, a unique collaborative autobiography with poems, prose, and art.

Lisa Carrington Firmin Colonel, Ret., USAF Carrington Firmin retired from the United States Air Force as its most senior ranking Latina officer, after leading The University of Texas at San Antonio's (UTSA) AF ROTC program to the best in the nation. Awarded a Bronze Star Medal for efforts in combat as an Expeditionary Mission Support

Group Commander in Iraq's Sunni Triangle. Has received many honors and accolades such as the Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, UTSA's President's Distinguished Diversity Award, United States Hispanic Chamber of Commerce National Latina Leader award, Governor of Texas' Yellow Rose award, National Diversity Council's Trailblazer and Most Powerful and Influential Women in Texas awards, Texas Diversity Council's Greater San Antonio LGBT Ally Award, Hispanic Women's Network of Texas Trailblazer Award, Distinguished Alumni Award from Texas A&M University-Kingsville, Community Service Award from National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution and a Military Writers Society of America book award.


In 2023, one of her poems was featured by the Department of Veterans Affairs in their new motto unveiling. She published articles in Military Officer and Latina Style magazines and led a Writing to Heal session during South Texas' Veterans Health Care System's Mental Health Summit. In 2022, she was featured in Hispanic Executive Magazine, was a participating artist in Uniting US's From Conflict to Creativity at the Library of Congress, and keynoted events across the country. In 2021, two of her poems were featured in a national art exhibit at the Military Women's Memorial in Washington, DC.

As founder of the Veteran and Military Affairs department at UTSA, she consolidated all veteran support services on campus, started priority registration and a tailored veteran orientation program, instituted scholarships for military affiliated students and created case studies and a Veteran Culture Competence training module. Previously as Associate Provost for Faculty/Student Diversity & Recruitment, she founded the UTSA Top Scholar and the Presidential Distinguished Diversity awards programs and led the addition of Gender Identity/Gender Expression to the university's nondiscrimination policy.

Carrington Firmin serves as a member of the inaugural Department of Defense Advisory Committee on Diversity and Inclusion (DACODAI), the Department of Veterans Affairs Advisory Committee on Minority Veterans (ACMV), a member of the Texas A&M University-Kingsville University's Foundation Board of Trustees, the first woman board member of the Hispanic Veterans Leadership Alliance, the Military Officers Association of America, the Military Writing Society of America and is a life member of the Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Women Veterans Alliance. She holds the National Diversity Council's Certified Diversity Professional designation and is a Certified True Colors® Facilitator. **B**orn and raised in El Sereno, California, MST2 Rosa Gomes Gavidia was instilled with a determined independence and deep pride in her Latina roots by her Salvadorian born single mother, Martha. Rosa completed basic training in May 2016 and reported to the USCGC POLAR STAR as a fireman, where she was assigned as a member of the auxiliary machinery team. While on board, she served on Operation Deep Freeze and earned her Antarctica Service Medal while on patrol to several foreign countries and Antarctica. After a year onboard, Rosa seized the opportunity to support Patrol Forces – Southwest Asia and deployed to Bahrain as an Anti-Terrorism/Force Protection watch stander. While based in Bahrain, she also supported operations in Kuwait, Oman and Dubai and earned the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal for service in the war against terrorism while on foreign shores. Following her tour in Southwest Asia, she attended specialization training to become a Marine Science Technician and advanced to E-4, beginning her career as a petty officer in Juneau, AK.
